Most of the time I didn't even put out a microphone for him. I thought I was saving him from embarrassing himself.

What must he have thought about himself?

A few years ago, he became the worship leader at his church. Last weekend we sang for wedding and he played and led vocally.

My daughter, Kristen, went to a local Christian school where she played on the basketball team.

When it came time for her to go to Abilene High

she told me she wanted to go out for the girls basketball team. I didn't think her skill level was anywhere close to what the other girls at AHS would bring so, thinking I was saving her from embarrassment, I discouraged her.

She never played again.

Both these kids are wonderful people despite my thinking I was doing the right thing.

Clearly, I was so very wrong. Kids need to be encouraged that life is full of possibilities. Sure they may try and fail but success is often born of failure. So very often we miss the opportunity to show our kids that "the sky is the limit" if they will just try.

Matthew 9: 26 says, "Jesus looked at them and said, With man, this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."

You want to "Change the World, One Child and One Community at a Time?" Show our young people that the God who wants them to turn their lives over to Him, is the God who can "make all things possible"!

History of Kiwanis

The first clubs were organized to promote the exchange of business among the members. However the members were distributing Christmas baskets to the poor.

A lively debate ensued between those who supported community service as the Kiwanis mission and those who supported the exchange of business. By 1919, the service advocates won the debate.

- Kiwanis was founded in Detroit, Michigan, on January 21, 1915.
- In the early years, Kiwanis clubs focused on business networking, but even then, members were serving the needs of the poor.

- By 1919, the organization had changed its focus from business to service.
- Kiwanis became an international organization in 1916 with the organization of the Kiwanis Club of Hamilton, Ontario.
- Kiwanis limited its membership to the United States and Canada until 1962 when worldwide expansion was approved.
- Until 1987, Kiwanis was a male-only organization. But after years of debate and growing support, women's membership was received overwhelmingly.

Kiwanis Service footprint

Service is at the heart of every Kiwanis International club, no matter where in the world it's located. Kiwanis members stage nearly 150,000 service projects, devote more than 6 million hours of service and raise nearly US\$107 million every year for communities, families and projects. Key Club members pitch in 12 million hours of service each year, and CKI members another 500,000 hours of service! Aktion club members donate another 92,000 hours of service every year. Add it all up, and that's more than 18 million hours of service every year!

The Eliminate Project

Kiwanis is once again joining forces with UNICEF to confront another threat to the world's children. In June 2010, Kiwanis International announced The Eliminate Project: Kiwanis eliminating maternal/neonatal tetanus, which aims to save 129 million mothers and their future babies from the disease by the year 2015.

Worldwide Service Project

Members and clubs contributed more than US\$100 million toward the global elimination of Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD), the leading preventable cause of mental retardation.
