

Program

Lora Lynn Christensen introduced Abilene Community Theatre's Mike Stevens, VP of Production Support, and Bruce Bachmann, Treasurer of the ACT Board as well as the acting Business Manager. Mike has been involved in 29 productions for ACT in just 5 years! He shared a bit of history of ACT stating it was founded back in the 1930's. The earliest production of record is 1954 with a production of "The Apple of His Eye" which was done at Fair Park Auditorium. In 1958, ACT moved to its current location, 849 Barrow, presenting "Twelve Angry Men" as the 1st production. Amazingly, ACT is in its 61st year of operation. Abilene has a thriving theater community. Mike encouraged the crowd to check out the options to see some terrific theatrical productions available in our town. There is an increasing quality of the productions. It truly is an exciting time.

Bruce Bachmann shared some of the recent changes as a result of the one year taken off to evaluate and re-group. They evaluated three important elements for the organization:

There are three buildings that make up the ACT complex. The round building is being used for storage, however that will change sometime in the future. The concentration at the moment is on the main building and the building to the south. The south building was formerly known as ACT II but is now the Abilene Community Theatre Center for Education. Hope Hartgraves and Debbie Crawford are heading up the education program for youth. They started classes for 22 youngsters earlier this month and are working on their first production, "Treasurer Island", scheduled for presentation in December. He talked about the black box theater workshop and the many opportunities for youth.

Kiwanis Through the Years: 2007

- OPENING CEREMONY FOR 2007-2008: Carl Lockett presided over the meeting. Randy Williams led the singing and Millie Brady played the piano. The program was presented by Ralph Fisher who is President of BUZZARD WHISPERER, a non-profit organization dedicated to the education of the public on buzzards and several other animal species. The highlight of the program was when Oscar the buzzard landed on President Lockett's head.
- Earl Williams presented the club with a check for the month of September in the amount of \$436.08. The amount was from a reading of 333 machines for a grand total of \$230,141.92.
- What is Ruby K pin? President Lockett asked members of the club to stand if they had a Ruby K pin. He was encouraging all members to set a goal for themselves as well as the club to achieve a Ruby K pin this year. The Ruby K pin signifies that you have introduced five (5) new members into the club. Think about helping the children of the community, one new member can make all the difference in a child's life.
- Bill Zavatson had the pleasure of recognizing members for having perfect attendance.
 Van Boozer assisted him in handing out the tabs to: Clarence Presswood 9years, Kristen Carnohan 11 years, Nell Sims 14 years, Billy Phillips 15 years, Donald McDonald 16 years, Glynn Hammons 21 years, Chris Carnohan 21 years, Ken Poynor 23 years, Russell Berry 23 years, A. C. Johnson 25 years, Grady Jolly 48 years.
- Jeff Goodin presented a special Veteran's Day program. Jeff entered the United States Army as a commissioned officer and had a distinguished career. He saw combat service in Vietnam in 1966-67, and again in 1969 as an attack helicopter pilot. He logged more than 1500 combat flying hours, and survived being shot down four times. This much decorated war hero was awarded the Silver Star, the Soldier's Medal, the Distinguished Flying Cross twice, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal for Valor twice, the Army Commendations Medal twice, the army Commendation Medal for Valor, the Vietnam Cross for Gallantry with Gold Star by the Vietnamese people, and 47 other Air Medals. He retired from the Army in 1980 as a Lieutenant Colonel after 20 years of service.

- The Denton Challenge: The Denton club and the Abilene club were very similar in size so Past Gov. Nancy Miller suggested that we should offer them a membership drive challenge. Denton quickly accepted the challenge and conducted an interclub to Abilene to prove how serious they were. The winner of the challenge would purchases books for the school selected by the winning club. Kimberley Cole designed the slogan "152 it is up to you." It was believed that it would take 152 members to win the challenge. The members of the Club responded and won the challenge; under the direction of Dub Pritchett the chair of the membership committee. JR Velasco arranged transportation through Arrow Ford for an interclub to accept our award. Those in the interclub were Sharon Jones, Van Boozer, Clarence Presswood, Richard Kincaid, Curtis Blackburn, and Carl Lockett.
- The Governors Banquet was held Monday evening December 3rd at the Christian Life Center of First Baptist Church in Clyde, TX. It was great to see so many members in attendance; Grady and Margaret Jolly, Nancy Miller, Bill and Margaret Hoogstra, Kelly and Sharon Jones, LuGene Lewis, Bruce and Charlotte Davis, J.C. and Arlyene McCurdy, Clarence and Dorothy Presswood, Caroline and Richard Lee.
